House Bills		
H-502 Telephone Land Line Price Deregulation: This proposal will permit currently regulated telephone companies the option to elect to be regulated pursuant to Title 62, Idaho Code, rather than Title 61, Idaho Code. In 1988, legislation was approved that allowed existing telephone companies to elect an alternative form of regulation, eliminating the monopoly and rate of return pricing system established in 1913, for all telecommunication services except basic local residential and small business services. H-594 Agriculture Land Preservation Tax: This proposal will create a due on sale tax to be used for the preservation of agricultural land. The bill states that once a change of use occurs to the property the tax comes due.	OPPOSE	House Rev & Tax
H-612 Mobile Home Park Eviction Procedure: This legislation would prohibit a landowner from evicting tenants of a mobile home park for 300 days rather than the current 100.	OPPOSE-W	Replaced with H-687
H-634 Drainage Districts Notice and Approval: This legislation would give drainage districts the ability to sign off on subdivision plats prior to the recording of the plat.	OPPOSE	House Amending Order
H-685 Annexation: New language is added, to provide that, except when the consent is obtained from those to be annexed, a city will give notice of intent to annex, hold a public hearing and hold an election seeking a 2/3rd majority vote. A city would not be allowed to annex new territory without the affirmative vote.	OPPOSE-W	Held-House Local Government
H-687 Mobile Home Park Eviction Procedure: This legislation would prohibit a landowner from evicting tenants of a mobile home park for 300 days rather than the current 100.	OPPOSE	House Local Government
H-716 Over 70 Exemption of \$150,000: This legislation would allow a citizen over the age of 70 to have a Homeowner's value exemption of \$150,000. The shift would be approximately \$5 billion in taxable value statewide resulting in a property tax increase of 5% on all property not qualifying for the exemption.	OPPOSE	House Subcommittee
H-739 Procedure for Erroneous Claims for 50/50 Exemption: This legislation provides authority and procedures for determination and collection of homeowner's exemptions from property tax in situations where the exemption is improperly claimed and allowed as a result of error, misstatement or misunderstanding. H-754 Expenditure Limitations: The legislation provides for a complex formula designed to limit the expenditures of the state based on a combination of population, CPI and other indexes. The measure mimics some current spending controls in law and adds new provisions for the budget stabilization account and a taxpayer fund that would provide a periodic refund when the balance reaches a certain level. H-759 Public Improvement Districts: The legislation provides this legislation provides for the formation of a public infrastructure improvements district by a petition filed by 100% of the owners of all the land in which the proposed district would be located. A district would be formed for the purpose of building new public infrastructure improvements to serve new growth and development, and to provide for the payment of those costs by the new growth and development. H-781 Property Value Freeze: Legislation that would freeze the property taxes of primary residences at their current values, but would allow for a taxable value increase of 3% per year. The valuation would be reset when the homeowner moved. The resulting taxable value shift is \$2.5 billion statewide.	OPPOSE	House Subcommittee
HJR-5 2/3 Vote Constitutional Amendment: This resolution proposes to amend the Idaho Constitution to provide that on and after January 1, 2005 any action taken by the legislature that would increase the rate of the state sales and use tax, the state individual income tax, and the state corporate or franchise tax, shall be approved by two-thirds of the entire membership of the house of representatives, two-thirds of the entire membership of the senate, and signed by the governor. The bill fails to protect exemptions and other forms of fees and taxes that could more easily be raised if this was in place.	OPPOSE-W	Withdrawn
HJR-20 Opposition to OCC Rules: The purpose of this House of Representatives Joint Memorial is to notify the United States Senate and House of Representatives and Idaho's congressional delegation that the Legislature of the State of Idaho is opposed to the rules finalized by the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC) that preempt most state consumer protection laws and enforcement of those laws as they apply to national banks, their operating subsidiaries and agents. Both Houses of Congress have either held or scheduled oversight hearings to address the OCC's preemption rules. The joint memorial urges Congress to carefully review the rules, and act to reassert its authority over federal banking policy.	SUPPORT	Senate Commerce Committee

S-1240 Assigned Agency by IREC: the bill authorizes a brokerage to assign a different sales associate to represent each party, provided the brokerage obtains the written consent of both parties and has developed an office policy to ensure that client confidences are not compromised. The designated broker would not be able to act as an assigned agent, but must remain a limited dual agent.	SUPPORT	House Business

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<p><u>S-1242 Fine Money for RE Education by IREC:</u> A consensus of industry representatives and the Commission determined that fine and civil penalty moneys should not be used for the general public, but should be used to benefit real estate licensees, specifically, by providing education with the aim of decreasing licensee violations. The bill authorizes expenditures for such education from those moneys.</p>	<p>SUPPORT</p>	<p>House Business</p>
<p><u>S-1284 Sales Tax Receipt Reporting by County:</u> The legislation would require that the state report sales tax receipts by county to give more information about where the bulk of retail sales are generated.</p>	<p>SUPPORT</p>	<p>Senate Amending Order</p>
<p><u>S-1287 Highway District authority:</u> The Legislation would give local highway districts ordinance authority.</p>	<p>OPPOSE-W</p>	<p>Withdrawn for Rewrite</p>
<p><u>S-1332 False Claims Act:</u> The legislation will give anyone the right to file a suit for the recovery of triple damages against anyone working with or providing services to the state of Idaho. The bill sets up a "bounty hunting" mechanism whereby anyone who brings the claim will be awarded attorney fees and half of the recovery.</p>	<p>OPPOSE-W</p>	<p>Held-Senate Judiciary and Rules</p>
<p><u>S-1340 Building Contractor Registration:</u> This bill will create a registration system for contractors and would require that all contractors be registered with the state Division of Building Safety. It would provide a mechanism for the state to remove contractors who prove to be incompetent, dishonest, or unprincipled from the registry.</p>	<p>SUPPORT</p>	<p>House Business</p>
<p><u>S-1389 Residential Mortgage Practices:</u> The purpose of this legislation is to establish licensing and educational requirements for all persons who originate loans and are not regulated under other laws of the state. This bill will provide for greater consumer protection. The bill also defines the relationship between a mortgage broker/banker and loan originators, making that relationship the same as described under Idaho Code as a real estate broker and sales associates and insurance broker and sales associates.
