Ordinary and Necessary Expense (aka Constitutional Amendment allowing financing for public hospitals) - Outlines ballot initiative that clarifies the ability of certain public entities to incur debt or long term financial obligations without voter approval provided that no tax dollars are used to secure or pay for said obligation.

Treatment and Consent for Developmentally Disabled - This legislation

Resolution was printed, but House leadership opted to postpone vote until next session.

provides a system whereby withdrawing or withholding treatment to developmentally disabled persons could be allowed if continued treatment would be futile or inhumane. The legislation creates a voluntary process whereby physicians or surrogate decision makers may ask a hospital ethics committee to determine whether it is medically appropriate to withhold or withdraw treatment. If the ethics committee determines that it is medically appropriate to withdraw or withhold treatment, the patient or surrogates will be given time to transfer care to another willing provider. Amendments also resolve issues that have caused concern or questions over the years, including identifying emancipating events that allow minors to consent to their own care- clarifying the hierarchy for surrogate decision makers- confirming that health care providers may still utilize

DNRs (do not resuscitate). and confirming that surrogates may execute POSTs

(physicians orders for scope of treatment) on behalf of the patient.

Trauma Registry Funding - The Idaho Trauma Registry was established in 2005 to collect data needed to analyze the incidence, severity, causes, costs and outcomes of trauma in Idaho in order to improve emergency medical systems and to prevent serious injuries. Only 29 percent of traumatic injuries are covered by private insurance, about one third were covered by government insurance, and an additional 22 percent were reported as self pay. EMS funding for the Idaho Trauma Registry has been discontinued. The proposed legislation increases the Emergency Medical Services fee portion of the motor vehicle registration fees by thirty cents and dedicates that amount to the operation of the Idaho Trauma

<u>Managed Care Reform Act</u> - Amends existing law relating to the Managed Care Reform Act to provide further legislative intent and to provide certain contractual obligations of a managed care organization.

Pulled, replaced by H0174

Medicaid Funding - This legislation is proposed to contain Medicaid costs and reduce reimbursement and benefits to align with Medicaid's budget constraints. Changes include both short-term and ongoing reductions. The ongoing reductions intend to provide for sustainable cost controls. Changes include: reductions in skilled nursing home rates, a freeze on intermediate care facility rates, a freeze on physician and dental reimbursement, the removal of the nonemergency medical transportation benefit from the Basic Plan, and the addition of disproportionate share payments to the hospital assessment calculation. These reductions reflect a significant share of the overall reductions needed in the Medicaid program. While almost identical to RS 18565, important changes have been added based on discussions with the Idaho Hospital Association. Note: While IHA did not oppose the bill when it was heard in the House Health & Welfare Committee, we did testify on the impact of any budget cuts to Idaho's community hospitals and our desire that the cuts do not become permanent and that the federal matching dollars are used to offset the deep cuts hospitals are experiencing.

Managed Care Reform Act - Amends existing law relating to the Managed Care Reform Act to provide further legislative intent and to provide certain contractual obligations of a managed care organization. Position: OPPOSED Note: This legislation is aimed specifically at Kootenai Medical Center and the North Idaho Heath Network and also has implications for other health networks around the state. Although changes have been made, there is still strong opposition to the legislation.

<u>Midwife Licensure</u> - Establishes mandatory licensure for midwives through the Bureau of Occupational Licenses. Delineates the scope of work for midwives, establishes provisions for medications and other actions that may be utilized, and outlines instances where midwives will refer patients to other medical providers and when clients may need to be transported to a full service hospital. *Position:*No Opposition Note: After multiple conversations with the medical community, including the IHA, IMA and Idaho Perinatal Project, sponsors of the legislation have made many changes from previous versions. The bill has no major opposition and is expected to pass this session.

Physician Visa Program - Establishes National Interest Waiver criteria for physicians to allow for a foreign physician pursuing a change in immigration status to stay in the United States in exchange for a commitment to practice medicine to an underserved population for a three to five year period. Idaho communities may only apply for the placement of a foreign physician after demonstrating their inability to recruit an American physician, and all other recruitment/placement possibilities have proven to be unsuccessful. This bill also modifies code pertaining to the Conrad J1 Visa Waiver Program to allow physicians to show proof of eligibility for an Idaho license as part of the application criteria. Successful completion of the residency or training program and an unrestricted license to practice medicine in the State of Idaho are conditions for employment.
